






Lavinthal Discard.

Lavinthal discard is used in NT contracts. It is perhaps just a little easier than Italian discard. When you have to discard

- play the suit that you're not interested in.
- The strength of the card play shows preference for the suit you want : a high card is preference for the highest of the remaining suits.

You won't always have the appropriate card to play to signal your preference: but P can interpret your signal with regard to what's already been played, bidding sequence and cards at the dummy.





Exercise 2817 You're East, playing defence. Declarer plays ♠ for the 4th round and you have to discard. You don't want ♣ or ♥. Discard a high card so that your P when in hand will play the strongest of the remaining suits. Here it's ♦. So discard the9 ♥







Lavinthal Signals

Lavinthal Discard: signalling for a lower suit

In the example below, clubs interests you! You don't have a low ♥ card, so discard a low ♦ card.





Exercise 2818 You're East, playing defence. Declarer plays ♠ for the 4th round and you have to discard. You don't want ♦ or ♥.. Discard the 4♦ When your P sees this low card, he'll understand your suit preference is ♣.







Lavinthal Signals

You don't have the right card?

This can happen very often!

- Use the bidding sequence or the cards at dummy to signal your suit preference to your P.
- In the example below, you're East playing against a 3NT contract declared by South. South plays for the 4th round and you have to discard. You don't have a low card to signal •. What card do you play?





Exercise 2819 Discard the 7♥: your P has the choice between ♣ and ♦. When he sees dummy, he will hopefully play TR!
