



The opener's rebid after a 1NT response.

By bidding 1NT, the responder promises 5-10HCP

It is the same number of points as a bid changing suit at the one level, but 1NT isn't forcing. The opener can pass if he likes.


1) Without a major to call and with a balanced hand:

- PASS with a first-zone hand (12-14HCP).
- 2 NT with a second-zone hand (15-17HCP).
- 3 NT with a third-zone hand (18-19HCP).



Problème E1286

PASS. If your partner had had 4 spades...he would have said so. It's better to play at the lowest level.



Problème E4814

After 1 spade, the opener rebids 2NT to show his second-zone hand

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
2) With a 4-card major...bid it!

How you call your two suits indicates the strength of your hand at the same time


- Minimum two-suiter: up to 17HCP (non-forcing)
- Maximum two-suiter: as from 17HCP (forcing for a round)
- With jump: as from 20 or more HCP (game forcing).

Careful! 8px'>

You will not always be strong enough to show your two suits

Problème E4816 Maximum two-suiter

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3) With an unbalanced hand and a 4-card minor, bid it! How you call your two suits indicates the strength of your hand at the same time.

4) With an unbalanced hand and no second suit to bid:

- 12-14HCP, repeat your suit of at least five cards at level two
- 15-17HCP and 6 cards, repeat your suit at level three.

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
