



#### 2NT in response to a weak 2 opening (major)

A 2NT response is asking for information. It shows an interesting hand with a minimum of 15 HCP. Of course, it's a forcing bid. It is used in case the responder is thinking of :

- Either a game.
- Or a slam.

Many players tend to respond 2 NT without any strategy or any good reason. Doing so, they give important information to their opponents....is this necessary ?



Exercise 20225 4 A Don't hesitate, go to game. You've got 4 tricks, your partner 5....It is reasonable to think you'll get 10 at the end !



Exercise 20228 2 NT. You must get more information, as you've got only 3 sure tricks.

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#### The 2NT relay response may be used with slam ambitions

With a strong hand and slam ambitions, the responder can use the 2NT relay response.



Exercise 20231 2NT Why not a slam with this interesting hand ? Ask the opener to give more information about his strength.

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### The weak 2 opener's rebid after a 2NT relay.

- Minimum : the opener repeats the suit at level 3
- With a decent opening : the opener names a high side honor at level 3 ( Ace or K)
- With a decent hand and a singleton or a void : the opener names it at level 4. This response denies a side high honor.
- With a strong 6 carder led by the Ace, without any side honor or a singleton : the opener bids 3NT

When the opener names a strength, the auction sequence is game forcing.



Exercise 20235 3♥ Now the sequence is game forcing (the opener has named a strength)



Exercise 20236 The opener has shown a singleton (or void). The responder will close to game or continue with slam ambitions.

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#### The responder's rebid after the opener's encouraging bid

After the opener's positive rebid, a level 3 support is very positive, and forcing. The responder is showing slam ambitions.



Exercise 20240 The responder has made a support bid at level 3 ( $3\Psi$ ). Now, the opener shows his short  $\clubsuit$  (He can't hold 2 honors beside his 6 carder).



Exercise 20238 Pay attention ! 4♥ shows a short ♠ suit...A 4♠ bid would prevent the declarer to play 4♥, indeed !



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
