



#### Response to a preemptive opening bid

The opener has said everything: a 7 carder, a maximum of 10HCP....and nothing else. He is promising 6 tricks. You are the one to decide what is happening next and which contract would be best for your pair.

- Any shift is forcing, except if it is at game level.
- Any support bid is a prolongation of the preempt, not a game proposal; the opener shall pass.
- With no stopper in the other suits and less than 13-14HCP, PASS



Exercise E1612 PASS: no stoppers and no support.



Exercise E1616 You must name such a nice major suit. You'd rather try 4♥ than 5♣. Your bid is forcing...your partner will tell you if he's got 2 ♥ cards.





### After a 3♣ or a 3♦ opening bid, you should bid :

- 3NT with 13-14HCP and stoppers in the other suits
- With a 2 to 3 support cards and about 10HCP, raise to level 4 (this is not a game proposal)
- Go to game (level 5) with a 4 card support and 3 tricks
- With a strong hand but no NT possible bid, name a new suit



Exercise E1611 With a fit and no stoppers in the other suits, extend the preemptive bid



Exercise E1619 stoppers in all suits...almost 9 tricks!





## After a 3 ♥ or 3 ♠ opening bid

- No support, no stoppers in the other suits and less than 12 HCP: PASS
- With more than 10 HCP and a 3 card support raise at level 4. That is a STOP.
- With 13-14HCP, stoppers in the other suits and no fit: 3 NT



Exercise E4453 PASS: your 3 Aces are not worth much... they will just minimize the defeat!

Exercise E4469 4 A and that's it. This is a STOP!
