



Responses to overcalls in a suit (without fit)

The replies without a fit in the partner's suit

Your Partner who has just overcalled can have between 8 and 17HCP (with more than 18HCP he would have doubled). The principles:

- Changes of suit at the one level are forcing
- 2 over 1 are non forcing
- 2 over 2 are forcing

A cue bid is often used to show strength and makes the sequence forcing.

If the player in 3rd seat bids, no bid is forcing unless made with a jump.



Problem E4860 A response 2 over 1 is non forcing.



Problem E4861 A response at the one level is forcing.





Responses to overcalls in a suit (without fit)

WITHOUT a fit and WITHOUT a stopper in the opener's suit

- With less than 7-8HCP: PASS
- At the one level with at least 4 strong cards and a minimum of 8HCP: change of suit forcing
- With at least 6 cards and between 8 and 12HCP: change suits 2 over 1. This is non forcing.
- Without a strong suit to bid and with 10 or so HCP: cue bid the opener which makes the sequence forcing. This bid doesn't promise a fit with your Partner, nor a stopper in the opener's suit (an investigating bid).



Problem E4861 2 spades Show your nice spades with at least 8HCP



Problem E5413 PASS With 5 ♥ and without a fit, you must pass. Your Partner has a ♥ void and if he doubles in the next round, you can pass with glee!





Responses to overcalls in a suit (without fit)

Without a fit and WITH stoppers in the opening suit:

- with 8-12HCP bid 1NT
- with 13-14HCP bid 2NT (with jump)
- if the overcall was at the 2 level, 2NT shows 10HCP and stoppers in the opening suit.



Problem E1096 2 NT When responding to an overcall at the two level, 2NT proposes game and requires a balanced hand of about 11HCP with of course a stopper in the opening suit.
